## Is your relative moving to a permanent place of residence with care?

This checklist will help you prepare for this.

	Ask your relative what they want to bring and what not, and divide it between the moving boxes.		Change your relative's mailing address at the municipality and other organisations (such as newsletters).	
	Decide what will happen to the stuff that is left behind. Divide valuable and useful things amongst all relatives. Ask a thrift shop to pick up		Cancel the empty home's rent or take care of the sale with a realtor. Deliver the home as promised.	
	all remaining items.  Decide who is helping on the day of the move. If you do not know anyone that can help, ask client support or care mediator.		Read the consent form from the care organisation, such as for sharing medical information, pharmacy, and authorisation. Let your relative sign these.	
	Take as many personal items as possible, and buy as little new furniture as possible. Familiar items help your relative to get used to their new environment. 	side as at home. <b>Let your relative pack a moving box</b> with things with a lot of emotional value.		<b>Check your relatives insurance situation.</b> Most homes have a collective insurance, but this is not always the case.	
	<b>Do not take any rugs to the nursing home.</b> They are forbidden due to fall hazard.		Check how additional health costs are insured. Sometimes, dental costs are included in the nursing home care.	
	Bring a television, these are often not available in a permanent care place.  Take pictures of your relative's favourite clothing combinations and give these to the providers in the nursing home.		Check how general practitioner's care is financed. This care can also be provided by a geriatric specialist. If your relative's care at the general practitioner is not included, they will probably stay at their current GP.	
	Mark your relatives clothing, linen, and towels so the nursing home knows what laundry belongs to each resident.		Ask if the nursing home provides linen and towels. If you prefer, you can bring your own linen and towels. You don't have to wash this yourself, the facility will take care of this.	
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			Think beforehand about where your relative will stay during the move. In most cases, it is better when they are not present when moving. Let them say goodbye to their old home. It will be a emotionally intense day, be prepared for that.	
			If your parter is the one moving, <b>make sure a relative goes home with you after the move</b> . After having lived together for a long time, it might be intense to go home alone
